GENERAL FLOWER SHOW RULES

1. This Flower Show conforms to the standards and objectives established by the National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC). All Divisions are judged by National Garden Club accredited Flower Show Judges and Student Judges.
2. The *Handbook for Flower Shows*, 2017 edition, with revisions printed in *The National Gardener* magazine (TNG) is the authority for all issues not covered by the Schedule, which is the law of the show.
3. Entries into all Divisions are open to any amateur gardener or floral arranger, except when noted in the Schedule. Each exhibitor is limited to one (1) entry per class, except in the Horticulture Division and the Botanical Arts Section.
4. There must be an emphasis on fresh plant material. No artificial plant material is permitted in any exhibit in any Division.
5. All Design, Botanical Arts, Educational and some of the Horticulture entries must be pre-registered. Refer to the specific Division Rules for entry details, limitations and requirements.
6. All entries are to be delivered to the Porter House at Old Poway Park, 14134 Midland Rd, Poway, CA on Thursday, April 11 from 4:00pm-7:00pm or Friday, April 12 from 8:00am-10:00am.
7. All exhibitors should complete official entry cards in advance using pencil. Address labels may be used. Entry cards can be obtained from the Flower Show Chairs, at the General Meetings or at the Porter House during the scheduled entry times.
8. Judging for all entries will begin at 1pm on Friday, April 12. No exhibit or ribbons may be removed before 3:00pm on Saturday, April 13 and all entries must be removed by 3:15pm.
9. The Consultants for each Division will check exhibits for conformity to the schedule prior to judging. Final determination for conformance is the judges' responsibility.

10. The Flower Show Chair and/or the Consultants for each Division will be available during judging for possible consultation. They, along with the judges, clerks and recorders are the only personnel allowed on the floor during judging.
11. The decision of the Judges is final. Exhibits must conform to the Schedule to qualify for an award. Exhibits that do not conform may be displayed but will not be awarded an award. Awards may be withheld if not merited.
12. The Poway Valley Garden Club (PVGC) will strive to ensure the safety of all items after arrival and placement but are not responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
13. California policy concerning use of State's native plants, noxious plants and those on the state's conservation list can be found at nrm.dfg.ca.gov.

To be eligible for a NGC Top Award, exhibits must score 95 points or more, be a first place blue ribbon winner, and meet all criteria associated with the Section Award. Descriptions and requirements for NGC Top Awards and PVGC Awards are listed under each Division.

DIVISION I - HORTICULTURE

HORTICULTURE RULES

1. The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the [*Handbook for Flower Shows*](#), Chapter 6, “Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division”.
2. In order to receive an NGC Top Exhibitor Award, the exhibitor must identify the entry by the correctly acceptable scientific designation or the binomial name. *Handbook for Flower Shows*, Chapter 6.
3. Plant material must have been in the exhibitor's possession as follows; 6 months for woody perennials, 6 weeks for combination plantings, and 90 days for all other plants.
4. All exhibitors should complete official entry cards in advance using pencil. Entry cards can be obtained from the Flower Show Chairs, at General Meetings or at the Porter House during the scheduled entry times.
5. Individuals may submit more than one entry per class or subclass if each is a different variety, cultivar or color. Specimens with a class designation in the Schedule may not be entered in the “Any Other” class.
6. All exhibits must be fresh and grown by the exhibitor. Plant material must be in its natural state and not altered by any treatment (oil, spray, dye) that changes its natural appearance. No wiring of specimens is permitted.
7. A plant that is considered a flowering plant should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. A plant that is grown for its leaves should be exhibited as a foliage plant even though it may flower.
8. Exhibitors may supply their own clear glass containers with no markings. Exhibitor's names should be on the bottom of the vase. Only clear plastic wrap may be used as wedging. Plastic wrap will be available during entries if needed. The wedging may not protrude above the lip of the container.
9. Only foliage naturally grown and still attached to the specimen are permitted unless otherwise stated. Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line, except for *Gladiolus*.

10. Container grown plants and combination plantings may be double potted as long as the inner pot is not visible. Unobtrusive soil surface coverings such as coarse sand, pea gravel, etc. are permitted.
11. The Horticulture Consultant, Placement Chair and/or Flower Show Chair are free to subdivide classes by color, form, size, cultivar, variety or other distinguishing characteristics.
12. Additional staging rules may be stated in Sections or Classes.

Cut Stem

One (1) single stem with a minimum of two (2) leaves, each with 3-5 leaflets, displayed above the vase rim. Sprays should show various stages with at least 2 open blooms. Rose entries should include the underlined genus (Rosa) and either the species name underlined (Rosa rugosa) or a cultivar name in single quotes (Rosa ‘Julia Child’).

Soft stemmed perennials and tropicals. One (1) cut stem per entry, unless noted otherwise, maximum 30" length. Leaves attached to the stem may be displayed above the vase rim.

Woody perennials, shrubs, and trees. One (1) cut stem per entry, 12 - 30" long from growing tip to the cut end unless otherwise noted. Leaves attached to the stem may be displayed above the vase rim. Non-flowering branches are exhibited for its foliage and may have insignificant flowers or unopened buds present.

Double potting and top dressing with appropriate material is permitted.

A combination container of a foliage specimen must have at least 3 different species grown in the container. More than one plant of the same species may be exhibited in the container and may have insignificant flowers or unopened buds present. Maximum mounted exhibits and pot size is 12” at the largest dimension. Double potting and top dressing with appropriate material is permitted. Handbook for Flower Shows Chapter 6.

DESIGN RULES

1. The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the [Handbook for Flower Shows](#), Chapter 7, “Exhibiting in the Design Division, NGC Policies and Guidelines”. The Division is judged by National Garden Club accredited Flower Show Judges and Student Judges.
2. Advance registration is required by **March 23, 2024**. Contact the Design Consultants Jennifer Kennedy (858-735-6958) or Dyanna Madro (619-889-1773).
3. Approved plant materials and rules for designs are printed in the [Handbook for Flower Shows](#), Chapter 7.
4. All plant material used in the design must be identified on a 3” x 5” card, provided by the exhibitor and included with the entry form.
5. Design must be the work of one individual and contain some plant material. Plant material in a design need not be grown by the exhibitor.
6. Unless prohibited, accessories and featured items are permitted. Back panels and underlays are permitted where stated.
7. Artificial plants and foliage are not permitted. Fresh plant material may not be dyed or otherwise treated by application of any substance.
8. The exhibitor is required to conform to the stated description and limitations of the design type if named in the class.
9. Class titles are intended only to stimulate imagination. The designer has the freedom to choose Traditional or Creative style unless designated otherwise by the schedule.
10. The exhibitor is responsible for finding a replacement and notifying the Design Consultants if unable to complete their assignment.
11. All components must be placed within the allotted space as outlined in the Schedule.
12. A **Novice** is an entry level exhibitor who has never won a Top Award in the Design Division of an NGC sponsored Flower Show (*see pg.4*).
13. It is recommended that expensive or irreplaceable items not be used. If used, they will be at the exhibitor’s risk.

SECTION A - DESIGNER'S CHOICE DESIGNS

"Festivals"

Eligible for: Designer's Choice Award, Award of Design Excellence, Sweepstakes Award, PVGC Novice Designer Award (Class 4)

All Designer Choice Designs:

- Designer has complete freedom of choice of plant materials
- Staged in a space 36"W x 30"D x 48"H, shown at table height
- Black floor length table covering will be provided by the club
- Must provide back panel or niche, underlays permitted
- Limited to four (4) entries per class

Class 1. ***Dia De Los Muertos***

- A Creative Tapestry Design
- A solid-mass design with a geometric closed silhouette(s)

Class 2. ***Lantern Festival***

- A Creative Panel Design
- A design using a structural panel(s) as an integral component

Class 3. ***Burning Man***

- A Creative Construction Design
- A design with strong architectural characteristics

Class 4. ***Mardi Gras - Novice Only***

- A Traditional Mass design
- Large quantities of plant material with a closed silhouette
- Plant material integrated and not grouped
- Choice of traditional flowers, no tropical flowers

- Not meant to be functional
- Artistically suggests service of food
- Plant material must be included in the overall design
- Exhibitors will provide table covering and all accouterments
- Staged on a 36” square table 30” high in the living room and bedroom of the Nelson House
- Club will provide the table

Class 10. *Academy Award Party*

- A functional, informal table design for one
- A floral design with/without accessories must be included
- Exhibitors may use an underlay
- Staged on one quarter of an oval dining table in the Nelson House
- A white niche will divide the spaces, no attachments on niche
- Allotted space is 32”W x 20”D x 26”H
- A white tablecloth will be provided by the Club

EDUCATION RULES

1. The Rules and Scale of Points for Education Exhibits are in the [*Handbook for Flower Shows*](#), Chapter 8 and 14.
2. A reservation must be submitted to the Education Consultant by **March 23, 2024**.
3. Education Exhibits may be the work of more than one individual.
4. Plant material is not required but is encouraged. No artificial plant material is permitted.
5. Display must cover a minimum of 18 square feet of surface area.
6. The exhibit will be displayed on a table 6'L x 30"W x 30"H with a dark green tablecloth.
7. Handout materials add to the educational value but are not required.

BOTANICAL ARTS HORTICULTURE RULES

Container-Grown Miniature Gardens

1. The rules for Botanical Arts are printed in the [*Handbook for Flower Shows*](#), Chapter 10.
2. A reservation is required. Contact the Botanical Arts Consultant by **April 1, 2024.**
3. The exhibit must be the work of one individual.
4. Emphasis is not necessarily on plants, but some live plant material must be included. Plant material must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for 6 weeks (by March 2).
5. No artificial plant material is permitted.
6. All plants must be correctly named by the binomial or currently accepted scientific designation and clearly identified on a notecard in a manner that easily identifies the location in the container.
7. Class titles are intended to establish a general theme and should not be taken literally. Overall design considerations include placement of plants, use of accessories, consistency of scale, plant selection and container/unit.
8. Overall entry size is between 5” and 15” at the longest point. Exhibits are staged on a 30”H table with a black tablecloth in Templars Hall.

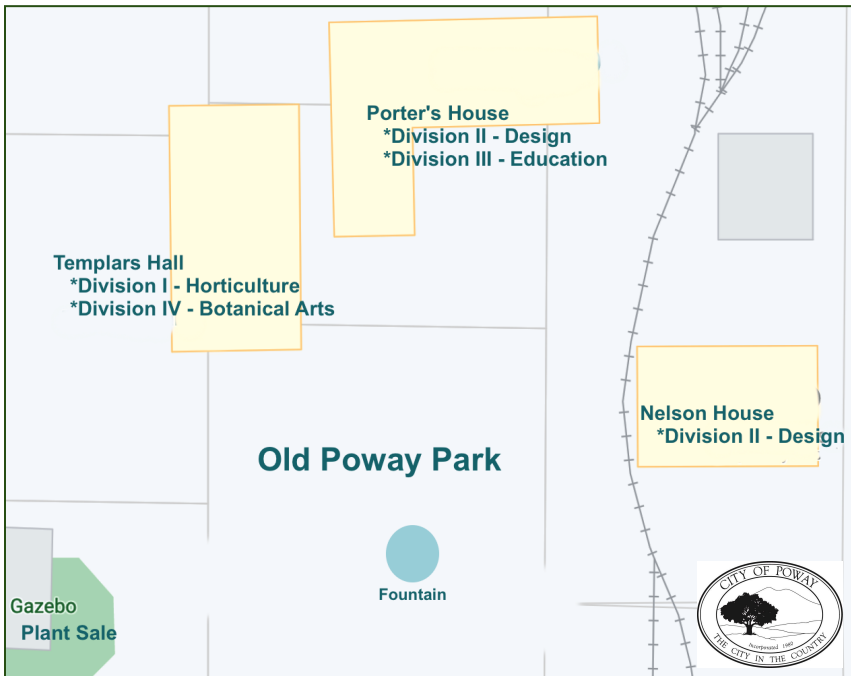
